Students seeking certification for teaching in history must complete the following:

History: HIS 105, 106, 205, 206, 220, 307, 321 (or 302), 496 AND three additional 300 level history courses (*), with at least one each from the European and World History areas

Areas of Study:

United States History: HIS 302, 305, 306, 307, 320, 321, 329, 337, 342, 352

European History: HIS 317, 318, 335, 338, 341, 348, 350 World History: HIS 302, 304, 326, 339, 342, 350, 353

World History: HIS 306, 326, 339, 342, 350, 353

Special notes: Students must take HIS 220 during the fall semester of their sophomore year.

HIS 302 and HIS 342 may count as either United States History or World History. HIS 350 may count as either European History or World History. HIS 306, 326, 329, 338, and 342 are cross-listed with PSI.

Additional requirements:

This program requires another teaching endorsement to be completed in addition to History. Social Science is strongly recommended (see the Social Science Advising Guide)

*** transfer students may take EDU 221 & 321 concurrently, not EDU 321 & 341
